


## MIOCR Grant Program Mentally Ill Offender Crime Reduction Grant



The purpose the MIOCR Grant is to address gaps in current services provided by the County and has three components:

1. Place a Behavioral Health clinician in the courtroom to screen mentally ill offenders as they are being sentenced and make recommendations for the correct level of care or treatment modality.
2. Provide mental health treatment in custody. This consists of a full time therapist in the jail.
3. Provide a Psychiatrist and Licensed Psychiatric Technician to provide walk-in medication and screening appointments for post-release mentally ill adult offenders who may not yet be able to access Mental Health services.

### Court Screenings

Amanda Corcoran, ASW, provides screening services at the Court House five mornings a week. In addition she sees inmates at the jail who require either additional or initial screening to determine appropriate level of care and possible program placement. Her services include a degree of case management as participants work their way through the court system.

### In-Custody Mental Health Treatment

Gricel Mendoza, MFTI, provides therapy to mentally ill inmates at the Jail. Inmates are identified through a variety of sources such as, court screening, jail psychiatric services staff, custody, FRS (Forensic Reentry Services), and families. Individual and group therapy are provided at her office in Stahl Hall or at the housing unit depending on the service and inmate's situation.

### Post Release

Erin Roberts, LPT, provides medication services to inmates released without access to medications or a follow-up doctor's appointment. In addition, sober living funding is available through this grant to support mentally ill clients after they have been released from custody. MIOCR will continue to track clients' post-release and ongoing treatment and case management services are provided by existing programs in Drug and Alcohol Services or Adult Mental Health Services.
