

AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT

INMATE & PAROLEE NOTICE



It is the policy of the California Department of Corrections (CDC) to comply with Subtitle A of Title II of the Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA) 42 USC 12131, et. seq., which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability by state agencies.

IF YOU HAVE A DISABILITY . . .

The AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT (ADA) may apply to you. If you have a problem with hearing, seeing, speaking, walking, moving, breathing, learning, mental illness, or diabetes, you may have a DISABILITY. The ADA says you cannot be left out of places, programs, activities, hearings, or other events because of your DISABILITY. The CDC has programs to help inmates and parolees with disabilities. These programs are written in the Armstrong Remedial Plan and the Clark Remedial Plan. Copies are in the prison's law library or Parole Regional Offices. If you cannot read or understand them, ask for help. The ADA requires someone to help you.

If you think you have a DISABILITY and are having a problem with a program or getting to a place in the prison or city, ask for help by using a yellow CDC 1824 Request for Accommodation form. You can get this form in your housing unit or parole office. Prison staff or Parole staff can help you understand how to use this form and answer any questions.

If you have a parole hearing and think you have a DISABILITY, you can ask for help by using a BPT 1073 Request for Accommodation form. This form is in the law library or parole office. Prison staff, Parole staff, or Board of Prison Terms staff can help you with this form or answer any other questions about your hearing.

The court has appointed lawyers for inmates and parolees to make sure the CDC is following the Armstrong and Clark Remedial Plans. You can write them at:
