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## Computer Literacy Learning Center (CLLC)

The Computer Literacy Learning Center (CLLC) services are provided by the Contra Costa County Office of Education (CCCOE) via a public entity contract with CDCR. CLLC's goal is to increase the literacy skills of 40 percent of the participating parolees by achieving a significant learning gain as measured by Comprehensive Adult Student Assessment Systems, after completing at least 40 hours of instruction. The computer curriculum focuses on basic proficiency in reading, writing, and math skills. The goal for each CLLC site is to provide 800 hours of classroom instruction per month that:

- Identifies the reading level and reading deficits of the enrolled parolees
- Provides a user friendly training methodology
- Offers participants the opportunity to progress to a General Education Diploma (GED)
- Provides training in life skills and employment competency

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**Location(s):** 15 parole offices statewide. In addition, CLLCs are also located in 8 Day Reporting Centers and 1 Residential Multi Service Center located throughout California.

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**Length of Program:** Learning gains are measured after completion of at least 40 hours of instruction in the lab.

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**Enrollment:** Referral by parolee's Agent of Record (AOR) via a CDCR form 1502, Activity Report

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**Eligibility Requirements:** All parolees subject to the jurisdiction of Division of Adult Parole Operations (DAPO) are eligible for participation. Parolee should have an identified Correctional Offender Management Profiling for Alternative Sanctions (COMPAS) need or low Test of Adult Basic Education (TABE) score.

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*CDCR's Division of Rehabilitative Programs (DRP) manages adult inmate and parolee rehabilitative programs. Its top priority is to provide rehabilitative programming and life skills to offenders in an effort to reduce their likelihood of reoffending after their release from prison. DRP is comprised of the Office of Offender Services (OS), the Office of Correctional Education (OCE), and the Office of Program Accountability and Support (OPAS).*

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
