Division of Adult Parole Operations, Sex Offender Management Program Overview

Objective 1

Division of Adult Parole Operations, Sex Offender Management Program Overview



Pursuant to PC Section 3008, CDCR must implement a sex offender parolee management and containment program developed in accordance with the standards established under PC Section 9003. SOMP is a comprehensive program consisting of enhanced supervision, sex offender Supervised Person specific treatment, polygraph use and victim advocacy, and is intended for the management of all Supervised Persons required to register with law enforcement pursuant to PC Section 290.

Electronic Monitoring Unit

The EMU is responsible for the CDCR/DAPO Global Positioning System (GPS) Program and the Electronic In-Home Detention (EID) Program. The EMU provides all of the GPS and EID training to DAPO parole agents statewide.

DAPO began utilizing GPS in June 2005 as a tool to enhance public safety. Electronic monitoring has proven to be an effective risk management tool in the supervision of high-risk persons on State parole (considered likely to reoffend) where knowledge of their whereabouts is a high priority for maintaining public safety. Since 2005, DAPO has become one of the nation's largest users of GPS technology, leading the way for other law enforcement agencies when it comes to supervising offenders through the use of GPS technology.



Sex Offender Unit



The Sex Offender Unit (SOU) is committed to the reduction of Supervised Person criminal behavior through the application of evidence-based Sex Offender Treatment (SOT) services. SOT services are provided to specifically decrease paroled sex offender's risk for recidivism. SOT is an integral part of the Containment Model Sex Offender Management Program (SOMP) approach to safely and effectively supervise sex offenders. The SOU is the Subject Matter Expert for sex offender risk assessment tools such as the Static-99, Dynamic and Violent assessment tools. The SOU conducts training to DAPO field agents with an emphasis in the containment model, to include analyzing polygraphs and containment team strategies. The SOU provides statewide trainings to parole agents and staff on new policies and procedures regarding the management of sex offender Supervised Persons.

Sex Offender Management Program Training

DAPO is committed to providing SOMP Parole Agents with enhanced training that evolves with changes to legislation, state and local ordinances, statues, and technology impacting the effective supervision of Supervised Persons participating the SOMP.

Chelsea's Law (AB 1844)

Objective 2

Chelsea's Law (AB 1844)

- In response to the **John Allen Gardner** case in San Diego County and the **Phillip Garrido** case in Contra Costa County.
- Increased penalties, parole provisions and oversight
- Longer parole periods for felony sex crimes involving physical contact with children (3yrs, 5yrs, 10yrs and 20yrs)
- Implementation of the Containment Model



Penal Codes

PC 3010(a) CDCR may utilize continuous electronic monitoring to electronically monitor the whereabouts of persons on parole

PC 3010.10 A person who is required to register as a sex offender shall participate in continuous GPS supervision

PC 3008(d)(2) Person's place on parole after July 1, 2012, shall participate in a sex offender management program

PC 290.09(2) The sex offender program shall meet the certification requirements developed by the California Sex Offender Management Board (CASOMB)

California Sex Offender Management Board

- CASOMB consists of 19 members (substantial prior knowledge of issues related to sex offenders)
- CASOMB addresses any issues, concerns, and problems related to the community management of sex offenders.
- CASOMB main objective is to provide guidance and prioritization of resources to achieve safer communities by reducing victimization.
- CASOMB develops standards for the certification of sex offender management professionals.




Enhanced Supervision Containment Model

Housing Restrictions

- PC 3003(g) Parole Agents shall be responsible for ensuring all High-Risk Sex Offenders who are released on parole for a violation of PC Sections 288 or 288.5 shall not reside within one-half mile of any public or private school (K through 12)
- PC 3003.5(a) All registered sex offender parolees shall not reside in a single-family dwelling with any other registered sex offender, whether or not that registered sex offender is on parole, unless the offenders are related by blood, marriage, or adoption.

(Residential Facility may house 6 or fewer)





Victim centered

- Recognizing patterns of offending and cycle of offense.
- The components of the containment model are useful tools in recognizing and identifying offense cycle and affecting intervention strategies to break the cycle of victimization.
- Conditions of Parole/ Special Conditions of Parole
- Parole Agents must undertake an individualized review of the entire record to substantiate release conditions.
- DAPO's policy is responsive, inclusive and sensitive to victims' needs.



Registration Requirements/ Tiers

- Tier One: 10 years
- Tier Two: 20 years (serious per PC 1192.7)
- Tier Three: Lifetime (violent per PC 667.5)

Registration period commences on the date of release from incarceration.

Pursuant to SB 384, an individual is ineligible to petition for removal from the registry if they are on parole, probation, or other form of supervised release.


Objective 4

GPS OVERVIEW



1. GPS SATELLITES

Our **BLUtag**® GPS device uses signals from a minimum of **4 GPS satellites** simultaneously to provide an accurate and reliable location of an enrollee.



4. SOLUTIONS CENTER

VeriTracks configures and displays all tracking data for review by our professional electronic monitoring staff at Securus and by the staff of the supervising agency.

2. GPS TRANSCEIVER

The Enrollee's ankle-worn **BLUtag** GPS device collects and transmits precise location data to our **24/7/365 Solutions Center** via cellular networks.



3. TRANSMISSION OF DATA

All GPS location data is received by **VeriTracks**™, our proprietary and secure, web-based electronic monitoring platform.






Track Review

81023.3.9 Global Positioning System Track Review Procedures


When reviewing and analyzing GPS track data, the parole agent shall:

- Conduct a track review each working day for all GPS-monitored parolees assigned to their caseload by displaying the points from the last GPS point viewed, up to the start of the most current day, using Point Pattern Analysis and/or Point-by-Point playback methods.
- Following a weekend, holiday, or scheduled day off, conduct the GPS track review by displaying points from the last GPS point viewed, up to the start of the most current day, in no more than 24-hour track analysis increments.



TRACKPOINTS

- GPS track points display the **direction (chevron)** in which the device is traveling.


Inclusion – Locations where offenders are required to be:

Crime Scene Correlation

81023.6 Crime Scene Correlation Policy

- Crime scene correlation is available to GPS-trained agents and DAPO-trained law enforcement agencies. Crime scene correlation serves as a critical investigative tool, and provides historical GPS data relative to specific search criteria. The parole agent may utilize crime scene correlation as an investigative tool on an as-needed basis to assist local law enforcements agencies and provide GPS information in a timely manner.

Crime Scene Correlation

What is Crime Scene Correlation?

In an effort to increase public safety, DAPO has developed partnerships with local law enforcement agencies statewide, to track, monitor and record the movement of high risk sex offenders and gang members through crime scene correlation. Crime scene correlation allows local law enforcement to input data into their computers regarding a crime that was committed and the computer will let them see whether or not a CDCR GPS monitored Supervised Person was in the area or at the scene of the crime. This technology will either eliminate the Supervised Person as a crime suspect or will place them at the scene of the crime.



Exclusions/Modifications

- Traditional GPS monitoring devices are designed to be **secured to a person's ankle**.
- Some circumstances of **mental illness and/or physical disability**, traditional GPS monitoring may not be an appropriate consideration or option.
- Modifications shall **only be used when absolutely necessary**.
- If traditional or modified GPS monitoring is **likely to cause serious injury or death** to a Supervised Person, a GPS monitoring **exclusion shall be considered**.
- **Extended exclusion or modification** to traditional GPS monitoring shall be **approved or disapproved by the DAPO Director or designee**, including the respective RPA, and shall be documented on the **CDCR Form 2193**.



Physical Disabilities






Physical Disability Procedures

If it is determined that a **physical disability exists precluding the Supervised Person from wearing a traditional GPS monitoring device**, or if traditional GPS monitoring is likely to **cause serious injury or death, modified supervision or exclusion** from GPS monitoring may be considered.


Physical Disability Procedures

Such physical disabilities may include, but are not limited to:

- **Amputated limb(s)** prohibiting traditional placement of a GPS device on Supervised Person's ankle.
- Diabetes or other medical condition(s) **causing severe swelling of limbs.**
- Supervised Person's current and/or continued placement in a medical facility with **diagnostic imaging equipment.**



Audible Tone when Low Battery



- The “**Audible Tone Feature**” is not mandated, but is available as a software enhancement, designed to provide two audible tones every 10 minutes for up to 10 hours when enrollees enter into a “**Low Battery**” event.
- The audible tone will continue until the enrollee plugs in their device to a charger or the device enters dead battery.
- Parole agents shall have access to GPS devices which have an option for an audible low battery warnings as an accommodation for Supervised Persons with mobility disabilities who cannot feel the low battery warnings using vibrations due to lower extremity paralysis or nerve damage, and to other reasonable accommodations, including wrist GPS monitors Supervised Persons with disabilities.





Objective 5

Sex Offender Treatment Goals

- Reduce criminal behavior through the application of evidence-based treatment.
- Recognize and change cognitive distortions.
- Teach internal control mechanisms to supervised persons with the goal of modifying their behavior.
- Encourage personal accountability
- Victim awareness

STATIC - 99R

- Provides a baseline of sex offense risk based on static actuarial factors
- Scored mainly on file information, by supervising officers

LS/CMI

- Assesses static and dynamic factors for general/violent criminal recidivism
- Scored on interview, collateral and file information, by treatment provider


STABLE - 2007

- Identifies sex offense dynamic intervention or treatment targets
- Scored on interview, collateral and file information, by treatment provider
- Measures change over time

ACUTE - 2007

- Assesses the current expression of sex offense related risky behavior
- Provides a warning when things could be going wrong
- Scored mainly on interview and collateral information, by treatment provider



Containment Team Meeting

The Containment Team meeting is a collaborative effort establishing a mechanism of consistent communication with all involved parties. The purpose of the Containment Team meeting is to review relevant case factors, sex offender treatment progress, dynamic risk factors, polygraph results, community reintegration, response to parole supervision, and supervision category.

Treatment dosage


High Risk Sex Offenders attend 8 groups per month and 1 individual treatment session.

Non-High Risk Sex Offenders attend 4 groups per month and 1 individual treatment session.

Other treatment services:

- Individualized treatment plan with assignments and goals
- 2 Polygraphs per year
- 4 Assessment per year





Treatment of medical/mental health clients

- Sex Offenders with serious/verifiable medical conditions will be authorized to receive Sex Offender Treatment services via Tele-Therapy.
- Sex Offenders with severe mental health issues will be referred to Behavioral Health Reintegration for mental health treatment until such a time that they can participate in Sex Offender Treatment services.

Special Conditions of Parole

Objective 6

YOU ARE BEING RELEASED TO PAROLE SUPERVISION, EFFECTIVE: _____, 20____, FOR A MAXIMUM PERIOD OF: _____.

YOU ARE SUBJECT TO THE FOLLOWING TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF RELEASE FROM PRISON:

If you violate any of the conditions of your parole or violate any law, you may be subject to arrest and/or incarceration in a county jail or returned to state prison, pursuant to Penal Code (PC) Section 3000.1, or PC Section 3000, subdivision (b), paragraph (4), regardless of whether new charges are filed.

You shall waive extradition to the State of California from any state or territory of the United States, or the District of Columbia. You shall not contest any effort to return you to the State of California.

You, your residence, and any property under your control are subject to search or seizure by a probation officer, an agent or officer of the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, or any other peace officer, at any time of the day or night, with or without a search warrant, with or without cause.

If another jurisdiction has lodged a detainer against you, you may be released to the custody of that jurisdiction. Should you be released from their custody prior to the expiration of your California parole, or should the detainer not be exercised, you are to immediately contact the nearest office of the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, Division of Adult Parole Operations, for instructions on reporting to a parole agent.

The procedure for obtaining a Certificate of Rehabilitation is documented in PC Sections 4852.01-4852.21.

CONDITIONS OF PAROLE

1. SPECIAL CONDITIONS: Special conditions of parole may be mandated by law or may be imposed at the discretion of your agent. Special conditions of parole that forbid conduct which is not itself criminal, must reasonably relate to a crime for which you were convicted, or must be reasonably related to deterring future criminality. **You are subject to the following special conditions of parole:**

2. RELEASE, REPORTING, RESIDENCE AND TRAVEL: Unless other arrangements are approved in writing, you shall report to your parole agent on the first working day following your release. The name, address, and telephone number of the parole agent responsible for your parole supervision shall be documented on the CDCR Form 611 (Rev. 08/12), Release Program Study, which is incorporated by reference as part of this Notice. You shall inform your supervising parole agent of your residence, employment, education, and/or training. Any change or anticipated change to your residence shall be reported to your parole agent in advance. You shall inform your parole agent within 72 hours of any change to your employment location, employer, or termination of employment.

3. PAROLE AGENT INSTRUCTIONS AND TRAVEL: You shall comply with all of the instructions from your parole agent. You shall not travel more than 50 miles from your residence without the prior approval of your parole agent. You shall not be absent from your county of residence for a period of more than 48 hours. You shall not leave the State of California without prior written approval of your parole agent.

4. CRIMINAL CONDUCT: You shall not engage in conduct prohibited by law (state, federal, county, or municipal). You shall immediately inform your parole agent if you are arrested for any felony or misdemeanor crime. Be advised, your conduct, if prohibited by law, may result in parole revocation with or without a criminal conviction.

5. WEAPONS: You shall not own, use, have access to, or have under your control: (a) any type of firearm, instrument, or device which a reasonable person would believe to be capable of being used as a firearm, or any ammunition which could be used in a firearm; (b) any weapon as defined in state or federal statutes, or any instrument or device which a reasonable person would believe to be capable of being used as a weapon; (c) any knife with a blade longer than two inches, except kitchen knives which must be kept only in the kitchen of your residence, and knives related to your employment, which may be used and carried only in connection with your employment; or (d) a crossbow of any kind.

6. THIS DOCUMENT SERVES AS YOUR NOTICE AND CONDITIONS OF PAROLE. You have the right to appeal the special conditions of your parole. Special conditions imposed by the Division of Adult Parole Operations may be appealed pursuant to California Code of Regulations (CCR), Title 15, Sections 3084 - 3085.

Special Conditions of Parole

CDCR/ DAPO utilizes the general conditions and special conditions of parole as a means of informing Supervised Persons of the specific rules governing parolee behavior. The authority to impose general and special conditions of parole can be found in case law, more specifically *People v. Lent*, and current regulations.

People v. Lent

Special conditions of parole can be imposed if there is a nexus or are reasonably related to the Subject's commitment offense, criminal conduct, and/or future criminality.

A special condition of parole that bars lawful activity is valid only if the prohibited conduct either:

1. Has a relationship to the crime of which the offender was convicted.
2. Is reasonably related to deter future criminality

(Example, "no alcohol", "curfew", "park/playground restrictions")



United States v. Wolfchild

Conditions that target a probationer/Supervised Person rights to associate with an intimate family member the supervising agency must "undertake and individualized review" of relevant case factors.

Individualized Case Factors:

- Position of trust/authority
- Familial Barriers
- Victims' ability to defend or seek refuge
