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- ## IN-PRISON OPERATIONS
- CDCR's DRP offers Cognitive Behavior Intervention (CBI) programming through the Integrated Substance Use Disorder Program (ISUDT) which offers 4 CBI modules:
- o Substance Use Disorder – Outpatient Program (6 hours per week for 16 weeks)
 - o Life Skills (6 hours per week for 22 weeks)
 - o After Care Program (1.5 hours per week for 13 weeks)
 - o Short-Term Education Program (One 90-minute session, option for additional 30-minute follow-up session)

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SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER PROGRAM

The **Living in Balance** curriculum provides addiction intervention for persons who abuse or are addicted to alcohol and other drugs. Sessions cover topics such as drug education, relapse prevention, available self-help groups, and sexually transmitted diseases (STDs).

PARTICIPANT'S RECEIVE:

- Evidence-based SUD curriculum – *Living in Balance* – featuring 47 individual sessions.
- Three two-hour group sessions per week for 16 weeks.
- Drop-in points throughout the curriculum where new participants can be added as openings become available to maximize participation.

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CBI LIFE SKILLS CURRICULUM

The CBI Life Skills module consists of three, two-hour group sessions per week for 22 weeks.

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AFTERCARE PROGRAM (SUD)

The Aftercare Program was developed to provide participants with formalized aftercare to prevent relapse after they have completed other ISUDT programs. The evidence-based curriculum used for the SUD Aftercare Program is *Smart Recovery: Inside-Out*. Research in Australian prisons showed that attending SMART meetings dramatically reduced reoffending rates after incarcerated persons are released.

PARTICIPANT'S RECEIVE:

- One one-and-a-half-hour group session per week for 13 weeks.
- Evidence-based SUD curriculum – *Smart Recovery: Inside-Out Workbook* (24 sessions).
- Two 30-minute one-on-one sessions used to develop individualized treatment /action plans and discuss progress in program.

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SHORT-TERM EDUCATION (SUD)

Approximately 900 individuals per month or 10,800 per year come to CDCR with between seven (7) to fourteen (14) months remaining to serve and are in need of rehabilitative programming and SUD treatment prior to release. To address the needs of this population, DRP has implemented the Short-Term Education program that provides SUD-focused programming for this population prior to their release.

PARTICIPANT'S RECEIVE:

- One orientation session
- A review of the evidence-based SUD curriculum – *Smart Recovery: Inside-Out Workbook* which will be completed independently.
- An overview of current resources available.
- One individual follow-up session (30 minutes) within two weeks of the Orientation (optional).

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OCCUPATIONAL MENTOR CERTIFICATION PROGRAM (OMCP)

- Voluntary program for CDCR's long-term and the Life Without the Possibility of Parole (LWOP) population
- Training program to become a certified Alcohol & Other Drug (AOD) counselor which can be used to obtain employment upon release
- Upon graduating from the OMCP, the mentors are assigned as co-facilitators, working alongside AOD-certified contracted counselors in CBI programs throughout all institutions

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13 CURRENT IN-PRISON PARTICIPATION

- o As of October 5, 2025, there are 12,566 participants statewide in 1,203 groups for Outpatient, Life Skills or Aftercare.
- o There are 610 total participants in the OMCP program
 - o 165 of them are Certified Mentors

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15 GRANTS BACKGROUND

- o California's Legislature provided funding to CDCR to support non-profit organizations who provide innovative rehabilitative programming to CDCR's incarcerated individuals population.
- o Increase the number of volunteers at underserved institutions
- o CDCR has provided a total over 600 grant programs statewide since 2014.

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16 CALIFORNIA ID PROGRAM (CAL-ID)

- o The CAL-ID Program provides a valid California Identification Card to all eligible Incarcerated Persons (IP) upon their release from a CDCR institution.
- o Having access to vital resources supports the IPs reintegration to the community.



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17 CAL-ID PROGRAM ELIGIBILITY

Currently CDCR screens IPs who are within 13 Months of their release date for the CAL-ID Program, applicants must meet the following criteria:

- o Have a valid Social Security Number (SSN)
- o Have had previously been issued an ID or Driver License from the California Department of Motor Vehicles
