INSTITUTION POSTING AND CERTIFICATION REQUIRED

This Notice announces the proposed amendment of section 3043.3 of the California Code of Regulations (CCR), Title 15, Crime Prevention and Corrections, Division 3, Chapter 1, regarding the Milestone Completion Credit Schedule.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

The public comment period will close on **October 30, 2025**. Any person may submit written comments about the proposed regulations by mail to the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR), Regulation and Policy Management Branch (RPMB), P.O. Box 942883, Sacramento, CA 94283-0001, or by e-mail to RPMB@cdcr.ca.gov. All written comments must be received or postmarked no later than **October 30, 2025**.

PUBLIC HEARING INFORMATION

A public hearing regarding these proposed regulations will be held <u>October 30, 2025, from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. in Room 101 located at 8260 Longleaf Dr. Elk Grove, CA, Building C-1. The purpose of the hearing is to receive comments about the proposed regulations. It is not a forum to debate the proposed regulations. No decision regarding the permanent adoption of these regulations will be rendered at this hearing. Written comments submitted during the prescribed comment period are given the same significance and weight as oral comments presented at the hearing. This hearing site is accessible to the mobility impaired.</u>

POSTING

This Notice shall be posted immediately upon receipt at locations accessible to incarcerated or supervised persons, and employees in each Department facility and field office not later than five calendar days after receipt. Also, institutions and facilities shall make this Notice available for review by incarcerated persons in restricted housing who do not have access to the posted copies and shall distribute it to incarcerated person law libraries and advisory councils. CDCR Form 621-A (Rev. 05/19), Certification of Posting, shall be returned to RPMB by mail or email. See Department Operations Manual Section 12010.6.7 for posting and certification of posting procedures.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Secretary of the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR or the department), proposes to amend section 3043.3, of Title 15, Division 3, Chapter 1, regarding the Milestone Completion Credit Schedule.

AUTHORITY AND REFERENCE

Government Code Section 12838.5 provides that commencing July 1, 2005, CDCR succeeds to, and is vested with, all the powers, functions, duties, responsibilities, obligations, liabilities, and jurisdiction of abolished predecessor entities, such as Department of Corrections, Department of the Youth Authority, and Board of Corrections.

Penal Code (PC) Section 5000 provides that commencing July 1, 2005, any reference to Department of Corrections in this or any code, refers to the CDCR, Division of Adult Operations. **PC Section 5050** provides that commencing July 1, 2005, any reference to the Director of Corrections in this or any other code, refers to the Secretary of the CDCR. As of that date, the office of the Director of Corrections is abolished.

PC Section 5054 provides that commencing July 1, 2005, the supervision, management, and control of the State prisons, and the responsibility for the care, custody, treatment, training, discipline, and employment of persons confined therein are vested in the Secretary of the CDCR. **PC Section 5055** provides that commencing July 1, 2005, all powers and duties previously granted to and imposed upon the Department of Corrections shall be exercised by the Secretary of the CDCR. **PC Section 5058** authorizes the Director to prescribe and amend rules and regulations for the administration of prisons and for the administration of the parole of persons.

INFORMATIVE DIGEST / POLICY STATEMENT OVERVIEW

Currently, Milestone Completion Credits (MCC) are awarded to incarcerated individuals that participate in Conservation (Fire) Camp Firefighter programs within the department, but do not provide MCC to incarcerated individuals that provide Fire Camp Special Skills support to the fire camps. The proposed regulations will add a new program to the Milestone Completion Credit Schedule (MCCS) for Fire Camp Special Skills, which will enable Special Skills workers to receive MCC for participation in the Fire Camp Special Skills program. This will benefit both the individuals that participate in this program by giving them skills that will enable them to find employment post-parole, and the department/CAL FIRE by recruiting individuals for these needed positions which are crucial to firefighting efforts.

In addition, currently incarcerated individuals do not receive MCC for participation in the programs "Essential Skills for the Workforce," "Certified Health Care Environmental Services Technician (CHEST)," or newly added Welding courses. By adding these programs/courses to the MCCS, incarcerated individuals who participate in these programs/courses will be able to receive credit for these programs/courses.

This action will:

- Amend the MCCS to add a new Fire Camp Special Skills Program to Schedule 2 (Division of Adult Institutions) of the MCCS, allowing participants to receive one week of MCC for each consecutive three months of camp assignment completed.
- Amend the MCCS to add the programs: Essential Skills for the Workforce, and Certified Health Care Environmental Services Technician (CHEST) to Schedule 3 (California Prison Industry Authority (CALPIA)) of the MCCS, allowing participants to receive MCC for these programs.
- Amend the MCCS to add additional Welding courses to Schedule 3 (CALPIA) of the MCCS, allowing participants to receive MCC for these courses.
- Remove the Printing program from Schedule 3 of the MCCS (CALPIA), as it is no longer available.

SPECIFIC BENEFITS ANTICIPATED BY THE PROPOSED REGULATIONS

The proposed regulations will allow for non-grade Special Skills workers to receive one week of MCC for every 90 days that they are housed in fire camps. The department and CAL FIRE will benefit by recruiting Special Skills workers needed for the fire camps. The Fire Camp Special Skills program will pave the way for job opportunities and will benefit incarcerated individuals after their release, as Special Skills workers who possess a skill set in these trades can be hired by CAL FIRE for a career post-parole. Additionally, the proposed regulations will allow CALPIA participants to receive MCC for the Essential Skills for the Workforce, and Certified Health Care Environmental Services Technician (CHEST) programs, as well as for newly added courses to the CALPIA Welding program. These proposed regulations will have a long-term beneficial effect by incentivizing individuals to accept and retain jobs during their incarceration. Participants in MCC courses will enhance their technical and social skills, instilling them with accountability and responsibility, and preparing them for careers after incarceration, which will assist with reducing recidivism and increasing public safety.

DOCUMENTS INCORPORATED BY REFERENCE

Milestone Completion Credit Schedule (REV. 05/25)

EVALUATION OF INCONSISTENCY/INCOMPATIBILITY WITH EXISTING LAWS AND REGULATIONS

Pursuant to Government Code 11346.5(a)(3)(D), the department has determined the proposed regulations are not inconsistent or incompatible with existing regulations. After conducting a review for any regulations that would relate to or affect this area, the department has concluded that these are the only regulations that concern the Milestone Completion Credit Schedule.

LOCAL MANDATES

This action imposes no mandates on local agencies or school districts, or a mandate which requires reimbursement of costs or savings pursuant to Government Code Sections 17500 - 17630.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT

EFFECT ON HOUSING COSTS

The department has made an initial determination that the proposed action will have no significant effect on housing costs.

COST IMPACTS ON REPRESENTATIVE PRIVATE PERSONS OR BUSINESSES

The department is not aware of any cost impacts that a representative private person or business would necessarily incur in reasonable compliance with the proposed action.

SIGNIFICANT STATEWIDE ADVERSE ECONOMIC IMPACT ON BUSINESS

The department has made an initial determination that the proposed regulations will not have a significant statewide adverse economic impact directly affecting business, including the ability of California businesses to compete with businesses in other states, because the proposed regulations place no obligations or requirements on any business.

EFFECT ON SMALL BUSINESSES

The department has determined that the proposed regulations will not affect small businesses. This action has no significant adverse economic impact on small business because they place no obligations or requirements on any business.

RESULTS OF THE ECONOMIC IMPACT ASSESSMENT

The department has determined that the proposed regulation will not have an effect on the elimination of jobs within California, but may potentially create new jobs, as incarcerated individuals are provided with job skills that will assist them in securing jobs once they are released from prison. The department has determined the proposed regulation will have no effect on the creation of new businesses or the elimination of existing businesses within California or affect the expansion of businesses currently doing business in California. The department has determined that the proposed regulation will benefit the health and welfare of California residents by increasing public safety due to better reintegration and reduced recidivism of incarcerated individuals upon their release into their communities. The State's environment will benefit by CDCR securing Special Skills workers for the crucial and necessary functions related to firefighting. The proposed regulations will have no effect on worker safety other than those related to specific job functions within the MCC courses.

CONSIDERATION OF ALTERNATIVES

The department must determine that no reasonable alternative considered by the department or that has otherwise been identified and brought to the attention of the department would be more effective in carrying out the purpose for which the action is proposed, would be as effective and less burdensome to affected private persons than the proposed regulatory action, or would be more cost-effective to affected private persons and equally effective in implementing the statutory policy or other provisions of law. Interested persons are invited to present statements or arguments with respect to any alternatives to the changes proposed at the scheduled hearing or during the written comment period.

AVAILABILITY OF PROPOSED TEXT AND INITIAL STATEMENT OF REASONS

The department has prepared and will make available the text and the Initial Statement of Reasons (ISOR) of the proposed regulations. The rulemaking file for this regulatory action, which contains those items and all information on which the proposal is based (i.e., rulemaking file) is available to the public upon request directed to the department's contact person. The proposed text, ISOR, and Notice of Proposed Regulations will also be made available on the department's website: www.cdcr.ca.gov.

AVAILABILITY OF THE FINAL STATEMENT OF REASONS

Following its preparation, a copy of the Final Statement of Reasons may be obtained from the department's contact person.

AVAILABILITY OF CHANGES TO PROPOSED TEXT

After considering all timely and relevant comments received, the department may adopt the proposed regulations substantially as described in this Notice. If the department makes modifications which are sufficiently related to the originally proposed text, it will make the modified text, with the changes clearly indicated, available to the public for at least 15 days before the department adopts, amends or repeals the regulations as revised. Requests for copies of any modified regulation text should be directed to the contact person indicated in this Notice. The department will accept written comments on the modified regulations for at least 15 days after the date on which they are made available.

Division 3, Adult Institutions, Programs and Parole

Chapter 1. Rules and Regulations of Adult Operations and Programs

Article 3.3. Credits

3043.3. Milestone Completion Credit

[Subsections 3043.3(a) through 3043.3(c) are unchanged.]

[Subsection 3043.3(d) is amended to read:]

(d) A Milestone Completion Credit Schedule (REV. 05/24 05/25) is hereby incorporated by reference. The schedule identifies all of the approved Milestone Completion Credit programs, the corresponding credit reduction for successful completion of each program, and whether credit for repeating the program is authorized. The department may authorize a program be repeated for credit if there are significant rehabilitative benefits to be gained by those incarcerated persons who retake the program.

[Subsections 3043.3(e) through 3043.3(h) are unchanged.]

INITIAL STATEMENT OF REASONS

The California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR or the department), proposes to amend the California Code of Regulations (CCR), Title 15, Division 3, section 3043.3 and the Milestone Completion Credit Schedule (MCCS), which is incorporated by reference in this section.

In 2009, new legislation amended Penal Code (PC) section 2933 and created new PC section 2933.05. PC section 2933.05 allowed the department to award eligible incarcerated people Milestone Completion Credits (MCC) for completion of approved rehabilitative program milestones to reduce their terms of confinement. In 2010, the Milestone Completion Credit Schedule (MCCS) was created to establish specific programs and credit allotments available to incarcerated people. Each program is divided into milestones (components), for which credit will be awarded.

The Public Safety and Rehabilitation Act (Proposition 57) was approved by California voters in 2016. This proposition amended the California Constitution to establish that CDCR shall have authority to award credits earned for approved rehabilitative or educational achievements.

The department is proposing to revise the MCCS, which is incorporated by reference in subsection 3043.3(d), to adopt new MCC courses, and delete one defunct MCC program. This will provide eligible incarcerated individuals with greater opportunities to participate in programs and to earn MCC upon successful completion of courses/programs and will update the MCCS to provide a correct updated version. The newly added courses will provide work and skill development opportunities to better prepare incarcerated individuals to find employment upon release and thereby reduce recidivism.

Fire Camp Special Skills Program

The proposed regulations add a Conservation (Fire) Camp Special Skills program to Schedule 2 (Division of Adult Institutions (DAI)) of the Milestone Completion Credit Schedule. This program will enable non-grade Special Skills workers to earn one week of MCC for every three consecutive months of completed camp assignment.

The Conservation (Fire) Camp is a voluntary program within CDCR, which operates in conjunction with CAL FIRE and the Los Angeles County Fire Department (LAC FIRE) to provide fire protection services. Within the CDCR fire camps, there are two separate assignments for incarcerated individuals: grade eligible (firefighter) and non-grade eligible (Special Skills support staff). Both grade and non-grade workers are paid for their time working in camp; however, currently, grade eligible workers earn two weeks of Milestone Completion Credit (MCC) for every three months of completed camp assignment, and non-grade workers do not earn MCC for camp assignment.

The accessibility of MCC earning opportunities within the institution is thought to play a role in the difficulty of recruiting individuals with specific training to come to fire camps. Currently, minimum custody skilled workers can receive a wider range of MCC

opportunities at the prison facilities than they do at fire camps. This makes it difficult to recruit Special Skills workers at Conservation Camps. The proposed regulatory change, or specifically the revised MCC schedule, will help recruit Special Skills workers to come to fire camps. Allowing Special Skills workers to receive one week of MCC for every three months housed at fire camps will help bridge the gap between the lack of MCCs available to camp incarcerated populations and those available to the incarcerated populations at the institutions/facilities.

By adding the Fire Camp Special Skills program to the MCCS, the department believes it will provide incentive for the recruitment of non-grade Special Skills workers. Special Skills workers help run and maintain fire camps as they are assigned to various positions, such as kitchen workers, clerks, laundry workers, porters, and gas house workers. Special Skills workers can also be assigned to a Mobile Kitchen Unit (MKU) during fire suppression efforts, and while assigned they are expected to maintain the MKU and provide meals for every firefighter assigned to an incident. Special Skills workers are essential to the functioning of camps. All camp functions are performed by CDCR staff, firefighters, and Special Skills workers.

The department is seeking recruitment for all Special Skills positions; however, the department is especially focused on recruiting individuals with specific training such as plumbers, welders, and electricians, due to the high demand for these positions in the camps. All aspects of camp maintenance and repairs are completed by the CDCR fire camp incarcerated population and the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection (CAL FIRE). CAL FIRE needs these Special Skills workers to help maintain their Firefighter 1 houses, which are centers that house their civilian wildland firefighter crews. CAL FIRE will hire Special Skills workers post parole, to help maintain these centers.

As of July 7, 2025, these proposed regulations would affect approximately 679 of the 1,997 incarcerated individuals currently housed at CDCR/CAL FIRE fire camps, by providing them with MCCs for Fire Camp Special Skills workers.

CALPIA

The California Prison Industry Authority (CALPIA) operates industrial, agricultural, and service enterprises employing incarcerated individuals in institutions under the jurisdiction of CDCR. CALPIA is adding two programs to the MCCS: "Essential Skills for the Workforce" and "Certified Health Care Environmental Services Technician (CHEST)." These programs are added to the MCCS as CALPIA determined that adding these programs would incentivize incarcerated individuals to participate in these programs by giving them credit for completion of these programs. Participation in these programs will benefit incarcerated individuals by providing them with vital skills that will assist them with employment once they are released from prison and provide relevant job training for employment in today's job market.

Courses are also added to the MCCS for the current Welding program and expand the

number of welding courses on the MCCS, enabling incarcerated individuals the opportunity to earn MCCs on all welding courses offered. Expanding the welding course offerings will allow those incarcerated individuals interested in welding careers to expand their knowledge and skill set within the welding industry, which will assist with their employment once released from prison.

Additionally, CALPIA is removing the Printing program from the MCCS as the printing company, Printing Industries of America, ceased in offering these courses.

These on-the-job training programs are a significant step toward aligning education and on-the-job training with real-world job markets, providing incarcerated individuals with the tools needed to be well-prepared for competitive employment upon their release. These on-the-job training programs are significant to CALPIA's mission of providing productive work and skill development opportunities to incarcerated individuals to reduce recidivism as well as increase public safety and institution safety.

CALPIA seeks to incentivize incarcerated individuals to pursue on-the-job training programs with CALPIA, and when incarcerated individuals participate in CALPIA work programs/courses, they:

- Spend more time in educational, self-help, and cognitive behavior treatment programming than those on the waitlist for CALPIA (have not participated in a CALPIA program)
- Experience re-arrest almost half as much as those who were only on the CALPIA waitlist (have not participated in a CALPIA program)
- Are significantly less likely to be convicted and returned to custody than those on the CALPIA waitlist (have not participated in a CALPIA program)

CONSIDERATION OF ALTERNATIVES:

The department must determine that no other reasonable alternatives considered, or otherwise identified and brought to the attention of the department, would be more effective in carrying out the purpose for which this action is proposed, would be as effective and less burdensome to affected private persons than the action proposed, or would be more cost-effective to affected private persons and equally effective in implementing the statutory policy or other provision of law. Currently, no alternatives have been brought to the attention of the department that would alter the department's initial determination.

ECONOMIC IMPACT ASSESSMENT:

In accordance with Government Code Section 11346.3(b), the department has made the following assessments regarding the proposed regulations:

Significant Adverse Economic Impact on Business

The department has made an initial determination that the proposed regulatory action will not have a significant adverse economic impact on business. Additionally, there have been no facts, evidence, documents, testimony, or other evidence provided that would alter the department's initial determination.

Creation of New or Elimination of Existing Jobs within the State of California

The department has determined that the proposed regulations will not have an impact on the elimination of existing jobs within California, but may potentially create new jobs, as incarcerated individuals are provided with job skills that will assist them in securing jobs once they are released from prison.

Creation of New, Expansion or the Elimination of Existing Businesses Currently Doing Business within the State of California

The department has determined that the proposed regulations will not have an impact on the creation of new, expansion, or the elimination of existing businesses currently doing business within California, as the proposed regulations affect the internal management of prisons within California.

Benefits to the Health and Welfare of California Residents, Worker Safety, and the State's Environment

The proposed regulations will benefit the health and welfare of California residents by increasing public safety due to better reintegration and reduced recidivism of incarcerated individuals upon their release into their communities. The State's environment will benefit by CDCR securing Special Skills workers for the crucial and necessary functions related to firefighting. The proposed regulations will have no effect on worker safety other than those related to specific job functions within the MCC courses.

BENEFITS OF THE REGULATIONS

The proposed regulations will provide eligible incarcerated individuals with greater opportunities to participate in programs and to earn MCC. By incarcerated individuals participating in Milestone Completion Credit programs, it will assist with their rehabilitation and future success and provide them with valuable job skills they can utilize once released from prison. Additionally, participating in programs has a beneficial effect by incentivizing individuals to accept and retain jobs during their incarceration. Participants will enhance their technical and social skills, instilling them with accountability and responsibility, and preparing them for careers after incarceration.

DOCUMENTS RELIED UPON:

CALPIA, in proposing additions to MCCS Schedule 3, relied upon the UC Irvine study titled – The Effect of Prison Industry on Recidivism.

The Effect of Prison Industry on Recidivism

<u>SPECIFIC PURPOSE AND RATIONALE FOR EACH SECTION, PER GOVERNMENT CODE 11346.2(b)(1):</u>

Subsection 3043.3(d) is amended to provide a new revision date for the Milestone Completion Credit Schedule (MCCS). The date is revised from "05/24" to "05/25." The MCCS is incorporated by reference in this section. The MCCS is comprised of four separate schedules for different divisions within the department. The schedules are numbered and titled as follows: Schedule 1 - Division of Rehabilitative Programs (DRP); Schedule 2 - Division of Adult Institutions (DAI); Schedule 3 - California Prison Industry Authority (CALPIA); and Schedule 5 - Health Care Related Programs (HCRP). Schedule 4 previously belonged to the Contract Bed Unit (CBU), but was eliminated in a previous rulemaking, as the Contract Bed Unit no longer exists. These proposed regulations include revisions for Schedule 2 - Division of Adult Institutions (DAI), and Schedule 3 - California Prison Industry Authority (CALPIA).

MILESTONE COMPLETION CREDIT SCHEDULE (MCCS)

MCCS, Schedule 2 – Division of Adult Institutions (DAI)

The proposed revisions for MCCS, Schedule 2 (DAI), provide for a new Fire Camp Special Skills program. The addition of this program will provide one week of MCC to non-grade Special Skills workers. By adding this program to the MCCS it will benefit eligible incarcerated individuals by giving them credit toward reducing their prison sentences, while also providing them with valuable beneficial skills which will assist with their employability once released from prison. The Fire Camp Special Skills program is a vital and necessary component to firefighting efforts.

MCCS, Schedule 3 – California Prison Industry Authority (CALPIA)

The proposed revisions for MCCS, Schedule 3 (CALPIA), provide for two programs to be added: Essential Skills for the Workforce; and Health Care Environmental Services Technician (CHEST). These two programs are added to Schedule 3 to enable incarcerated individuals to earn MCC when they participate in these programs. Providing these additional programs will incentivize incarcerated individuals to pursue on-the-job training opportunities with CALPIA.

Additionally, revisions to Schedule 3 add four welding courses to the current Welding program (MIG – GMAW-1-4G, TIG – GTAW-1-4G, TIG – GTAW-2-4G, and TIG – GTAW-3-4G). The addition of these four courses to Schedule 3 will enable incarcerated

individuals to earn MCC when they participate in any welding course and allow incarcerated individuals interested in welding careers to expand their knowledge and skill set within the welding industry, which will assist with their employment once released from prison.

Lastly, CALPIA is removing the Printing program from the MCCS as the printing company, Printing Industries of America, ceased in offering these courses. Also, for correction purposes, "-3G" is added to the course title numbering at the end of each welding course that was already in the existing Schedule 3, as this was inadvertently omitted when the courses were initially adopted; 4G identifies those courses that are more advanced in their curriculum.

By adding these CALPIA programs to the MCCS, incarcerated individuals will be more likely to seek on-the-job training programs with CALPIA, which will help with their employment upon release, and reduce recidivism.
